Father's Message Dear faithful;

While Thanksgiving Day is not a liturgical feast of the Orthodox Church, its meaning and spirit can deeply resonate with our Orthodox Christian faith

and practice. At its heart, Thanksgiving is about giving thanks — an act that lies at the very center of Orthodox spirituality. The word "Eucharist," which is the most important and sacred act of worship in the Orthodox Church, literally "thanksgiving" Greek means (eucharistia). Every Divine Liturgy is an offering of gratitude to God for His countless blessings, His mercy, and above all, the gift of life in Christ. In this sense, setting aside a day as a nation to give thanks naturally aligns with what we are called to do as Orthodox Christians every day.

Thanksgiving also provides a meaningful opportunity to reflect on God's providence. Just as the early settlers thanked God for sustaining them through hardship, Orthodox Christians are reminded to see the hand of God in all circumstances — both in abundance and in trial. Gratitude is not merely a polite response to good fortune; it is a spiritual discipline that shapes our hearts to trust and love God more deeply. By gathering with family and friends to offer thanks, we acknowledge that all good things come from Him, the "Giver of every good and perfect gift" (James 1:17).

Moreover, Thanksgiving encourages us to extend our gratitude beyond words and into action. In Orthodox tradition, true thanksgiving is expressed not only in prayer but also in love for others — especially those in need. Acts of charity, hospitality, and service dur-

ing this season embody the Christian calling to see Christ in our neighbor. Just as the Eucharist leads us to live — with open hearts and hands — the Thanksgiving holiday can be a time to renew our commitment to living with gratitude and generosity.

When we gather around the family table on this November day, let us acknowledge that every good gift comes from above, the Father of Lights. The Orthodox spiritual life calls us to cultivate constant remembrance of God and gratitude for His providence. Yet our fallen nature tends toward forgetfulness and complaint. Thanksgiving serves as a pause button on our anxious striving, inviting even the secular world to do what we as Orthodox should do daily: give thanks in all circumstances.

The gathering of family and friends across a table laden with abundance reminds us that we are stewards, not owners, of God's creation.

Those of us who are able should reach-out and invite others who are alone or students from out of town to join you on this day when we offer prayers of thanks to our Lord.

Let us as Orthodox Christians receive Thanksgiving as a gift—a day when the whole culture briefly stumbles toward what we know to be true: that thanksgiving is not merely a day of gathering but a day we prostrate before the loving God who gives us all things richly to enjoy.

In this way, while Thanksgiving Day is a civil holiday, its essence harmonizes beautifully with our Orthodox Christian life. It becomes an occasion to give glory to God, to nurture thankful hearts, and to share His blessings with those around us.





#### DID YOU KNOW THE COLORS IN ORTHODOX ICONS TELL A STORY?

In Orthodox iconography, every detail is intentional, and the colors are no exception. When we look at icons of the Mother of God (the Panagia) and Christ, their clothing says something deep about who they are.


The Mother of God is usually shown wearing a red or deep burgundy outer garment and a blue inner garment. Blue is the color of divinity, of glory, heavenly majesty, and life beyond this world. Red, on the other hand, symbolizes humanity, the earthly, the created. So, the Panagia wears red over blue because, though fully human, she was chosen by the Holy Spirit to give birth to the Son of God and became the dwelling place of God.

Christ, in contrast, is often shown wearing a blue outer garment and a red inner one. Why? Because He is God, who became human. The outer blue represents His divine nature, while the inner red represents His human nature.

The colors reverse, but together, they show the mystery of the Incarnation: God becoming human and dwelling among us.

Orthodox Icons are theology in color. These images reveal more than a moment in time because they expose fundamental truths. The way the Panagia and Christ are clothed in iconography isn't just beautiful. It's a visual confession of our faith.

So, next time you gaze at an icon, let the colors speak to you, too. They're telling us the most incredible story ever lived.



The objectives of the Sunday School are derived from the objectives of the Church. Thus, the Sunday School is responsible to the Church to help accomplish the

goals of spiritual growth, outreach, education, application, and fellowship. The primary goal of the Sunday School program is to guide our youth towards the Orthodox vision of a relationship with God and the Church.

Our Mission is to minister to and inspire our youth to assimilate Orthodox thought and theology and participate in the liturgical, sacramental, and communal life of the Orthodox Faith.

Sunday School is taught by a group of dedicated volunteers who aim to nurture and to partner with our youth as they experience the Orthodox faith so that ultimately they may unite with and share a life in Christ and experience Orthodoxy as a way of life.

Students are exposed to and learn about the faith primarily through the divine services of the Church. Sunday school lessons focus on helping students develop a personal relationship with God through active participation in the Divine Liturgy and special services of the Church and teaching the elements of Holy Tradition and Scripture that are the source of Orthodox faith, doctrines, and practices. In addition, children are encouraged to take an active role when attending Liturgy by serving in the Altar, Choir, Processions, reading Scripture, and making Oratorical presentations.

Why is Sunday School so important? Sunday School provides another practical way to do ministry and to be involved with others. Through Sunday School, everyone can exercise their Holy Spirit given gifts. The Apostle Peter instructed: "Just as each one has received a gift, use it to serve others, as good stewards of the varied grace of God" (1 Peter 4:10).

The teachers and our director of the Sunday Church School Program are fellow parishioners who love children and show a desire to serve our Lord through the stewardship of teaching. They stand as role models for our children. The curriculum in use is from the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese Department of Religious Education and is supplemented with other materials and activities obtained from other Orthodox Christian sources. Our Teachers include: Angela Fullmer, Director, Devyn Schmalz & Melissa Black K-2nd Grades, Ashley Tarasau & Svitlana Hoskin, 3rd-5th Grades, Kade Schmalz, Brandon Black for the Older Students.



# What is the Nativity Fast?

The Nativity Fast (**November 15th to December 24**) sanctifies the last part of the year and is established so that by the day of the Nativity of Christ we will purify ourselves by repentance, prayer and abstinence. As a result, we could piously meet the Son of God who came to this world and, in addition to the usual gifts and sacrifices, bring Him a pure soul and a passionate intention to follow His commandments and teachings.

Saint Simeon of Thessalonica described this autumn fast this way, "The fast of the Nativity depicts the fast of Moses, who, after fasting for forty days and nights, received the inscription of the words of God on stone tablets. We, fasting for forty days, contemplate and accept the living word from the Virgin, inscribed not on stone, but incarnate and born, and partake of His Divine Body and Blood".

St. Leo the Great says about fasting that "the very keeping of abstinence is sealed by four times, so that during the year we know that we constantly need purification and that when life is scattered, we should always try to destroy sin by fasting and alms." He calls this time of fasting "a sacrifice to God for the fruits gathered... As the Lord has given us the fruits of the earth, so we should be generous to the poor during the fast."

Fasting is something without which we will not be able to overcome the evil one's forces; as the Bible says: "this kind goes not out but by prayer and fasting" (Mt. 17:21). Fasting strengthens our prayer and, as an action connected with our body, it weakens sinful desires of our body. The soul needs training, endurance. This training is fasting, the support is prayer. Even the body becomes weak unless we do exercises and train it.

### Reading the Holy Scripture is an important spiritual support during the fast:

It is very important to read the Holy Scripture during fast as it gives a spiritual support. One should not forget that there are daily Gospel and Epistle readings, which are indicated in the parish calendars. Also in the Daily Spiritual Encouragement messages are sent daily to our parishioners. It is recommended to read the Gospel and the Epistle of the day every day right after the morning prayers. These are short pieces of reading and it will be very good if a believer meditates on the subject of the reading during the day.

### **Guidance for the Nativity Fast**

By avoiding certain foods (particularly meat and dairy products while also focusing more on our Christian duties (prayer, study, self-reflection and helping others), we can enjoy the grace of more spiritual calm and less worldly stress. Each individual and family should discuss to the degree they wish to observe the fast according to their particular situation, for example the elderly, the infirm, young children, illness, medication, etc. Note there is no abstinence of fish, shell-fish, vegetables and vegetable products, olive oil, fruit and wine. Without damaging or endangering our health, when we depend less on externals and on our own needs, we can cultivate a deeper relationship with God and more dependence on Him.

The **Thanksgiving Holiday**: several years ago, responding to the request of the faithful under its jurisdiction in America, the Patriarchate of Constantinople applied "economia" and discreetly granted its blessing for those who live in America to break the fast around Thanksgiving while focusing on the unity of the family and the "Eucharistic" aspects of the feast, but quickly return to the observance of the fast afterwards.
